A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Today we welcome, Bishop Barber to our parish. He is celebrating the sacrament of Confirmation as he does every other year. This year Bishop Barber is marking his tenth anniversary as the Bishop of Oakland. We pray for him at every Mass that is celebrated every day when his name is mentioned in the course of the



Eucharistic prayers. May our prayers for him continue to be answered as he shepherds this diocese. He has had many tough decisions to make over the decade. As he prays for the gifts of the Holy Spirit to come and strengthen the lives of our young candidate, may that same Holy Spirit guide our bishop.

As I hope you read recently in the April edition of our diocesan periodical, the MAP process is coming to the point of making decisions about all our parishes and schools so that the gifts we have in the diocese will be used in the best ways and continue to give honor to God as we face a very changeling world as the Body of Christ. The bishop has the burden of making the final decisions that will forever alter our diocese. May the good things the Lord has begun in our diocese continue a path to the fulfillment God desires for us!

Congratulations to our Confirmation candidates. Your diligence over the past two years of study, retreats, discussions, social justice service and meditation/prayer now comes to a major point as you become fully initiated members of the Church. We are very proud of you and look forward to seeing you now in the ministries that serve the whole parish. I have interviewed all of the candidates and am again delighted in recognizing the growth in the faith that has taken place in each one of them. Each candidate has carefully thought of the new name most are choosing as they are confirmed. They have made their choices not because it is a family name or tradition but because something or some words of the saint has touched their hearts to the point, they wish to follow the same or similar path the saint followed. As prayed for our diocese and bishop, may the good things the Lord has begun in each of the new confirmandi be brought to fulfillment!

It is with gratitude and praise that I thank Jenny Bruni and the whole Confirmation team for the care, guidance, and example you have given to these outstanding young people. You will never know the impact completely you have on them this day and how it will guide them to be closer to God for the rest of their lives. Our whole parish is grateful for your generous time and example to these students over the past few years.

A quick thanks again to all who put together and made the Ravioli dinner such a great success. Over two hundred people came and had a wonderful meal and wonderful time reconnecting with old friends and new friends. Peter Nuti, chef extraordinaire, commented that it was the first time he worried that they might run out of food. That did not happen, but what happened was an event that seemed like the days before Covid. Thanks to Keri Nims and Jenny Bruni who made sure even with big challenges that it was a great event. Thanks to all the young people who volunteered time and energy to set up, serve and clean up the event center for this event. Thanks to the Men's Club for your ongoing service in making sure all kept hydrated. Since the school auction event bumped this event to a later date this year, plans are already in the works for next year's event. Since the school auction is going back to a November date, the Ravioli dinner will be moved back to an earlier date. Watch for the announcement about it soon!

Continuing to follow Pope Benedict's exhortation (<u>Sacramentum Caritatis</u>) after the Synod on the Eucharist that encompasses Eucharistic Revival in three clear components: a mystery to be believed, a mystery to be celebrated, and a mystery to be lived. I offer some words about the third component, 'a mystery to be lived' paraphrasing Paul Bernier, SSS from his excellent book on the Eucharist entitled: <u>Bread Broken and Shared,</u> Broadening our vision of Eucharist. The author writes:

"Each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we end with the words " through him, with him and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor are yours, almighty Father, forever and ever." We acknowledge that the only way to honor and please the Father is in, with and through Christ. If we are to develop a eucharistic mind and heart, we will recognize that Christ's way is the way of service to others. (When we receive, we become the living tabernacles and Christ's bearer to our family, friends, the world.) We will appreciate the fact that his generous gift is his presence within the community, for that is where we should be able to find strength and support, loving care, and concern. We are all meant to form part of that sharing Christian community which finds in the Eucharist the high point of its self-expression and the inspiration for continued growth.

After this, it's only a question of practice. Having reminded ourselves of true priorities, we can concentrate on two areas. The first is greater service and generosity, both within our own immediate community and without. Instead of examining our consciences each day on the things we have done wrong, we can look for what we have done right, how we have made the world a better and more Christlike place. We can strive to recognize Christ more easily in the poor and oppressed, remembering that Jesus himself identified with "the least of the brothers." Is it too much to expect some positive action each day on behalf of others?

Eucharist is the second area. We should celebrate with humility, knowing that we always fall short of the self-gift which it implies. Reminding ourselves that the failure of others to appreciate its community dimensions resulted in the severe judgment form Paul (see Letter to the Corinthians) will prevent us from
