A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Happy Holy Week! Happy Palm Sunday!

We are all called to stop regular activities and business as best as we can. At the parish we ask that all groups, scouts, sports, men's club cancel regular meetings so we can spend the week



thinking and praying about what has initially brought us together: the passion, betrayal, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

The Church sets up this time to be our annual retreat as we focus in on the story of our redemption and the cause for our hope in the resurrection. I therefore invite you to take time for yourselves to reflect on what God has done for us and participate in the sacred liturgies of the Triduum beginning on Thursday night.

On Tuesday of this week, priests and parishioners gather at the Cathedral for the Chrism Mass. At this liturgy, the holy oils are blessed by the bishop and priests for us during the sacraments that require oil for their administration during the rest of the year until Holy Week, 2026. The oil of Catechumens anoints the unbaptized and welcomes them to the path of Baptism. The Oil of the Sick is used to anoint and pray for healing for all seriously afflicted in body, mind, or spirit whenever that is needed. The bishop physically breaths in his own spirit into this fragrant oil that is used at Baptisms, Confirmations and Holy Orders.

This weekend, we sing Hosannas and wave palms and sing all glory, laud, and honor to Jesus Christ our King. The Liturgy calls on all of us to process. Processions remind us that we are all on the way throughout our lives following Christ to his death and then to his and our resurrection.

Holy Thursday celebrates the last time Jesus has supper with his disciples before the cross and we commemorate the institution of the Eucharist. Jesus washes the feet of his disciples and invites us to renew our service to one another following his example.

Then we sit and watch into the night as his disciples tried long ago. This moment of adoration is the most appropriate time for this practice in the whole year. It also gives us time to ask ourselves if we can continue and do more for the poor and those who need God's mercy. Several years ago, we sponsored a family fleeing certain death from Afghanistan. We are reminded that there are still many families in need of

refuge and support as our world continues to wage senseless wars and purges.

Good Friday confronts us with the cross. The death of Jesus and the kind of death he died is so appalling, horrific, and grotesque that we ought to be shocked by it. We should be stunned into speechlessness at the thought that the Lord of the Universe, the Creator of the World, Word-made-flesh, and Splendor of the Father ended his ministry of love choking out his last agonized words on a Roman cross.

The wisdom of unveiling the cross on this day invites us to view the cross not as a fashion item or a phenomenally successful piece of branding by the Church, but as the awful reality of the saving love God showed us in his Son. God gave his beloved Son so our sins would be forgiven, and we would have an open path to eternal life.

The ancient liturgy of Good Friday helps us grasp this love.

Good Friday only makes sense if we continue to the proclamation of Easter. The cross teaches us the truth that God took upon Himself the true pain of the sins of the world, but we are also reminded that sin and pain and death do not have the last word. Rather, God has the last word; and as His first word was the word of creation, so this last word is a word of re-creation and new life.

As Christians, we do not say that death is nothing at all. Jesus wept at the death of his friend Lazarus and at the sorrow that his death caused those who loved him. Death is no illusion; but for us who are Christ's friends, death is not the end of the story, but the beginning of the last and most glorious chapter of our life stories. Not just an awkward interruption in our lives, death – the disastrous result of human sin – has been transformed by God into the gateway to an utterly new kind of life.

So come and hear this proclaimed in the many readings of the Great Vigil. Renew your own commitment to Christ as you witness, our brother, Francis, among us who is baptized and fully initiated into the Church. Taste anew the Bread of Life that has come down from heaven to give us eternal life.

May each of you find the time and the ability to make this week holy. May each of us, pray for one another and support one another by word and deed so that God's plan may be fulfilled in each of us! May God's mercy that we celebrate this year, be especially present in our lives this week so that it will guide our every step in this life and to the life to come.
